Message from the Principal



This week Mr Aung spoke during our whole school assembly about resilience. He shared how resilience isn't something we are born with, but something that we can develop. Resilience is shown by our students who turn up to school every single day despite feeling a bit tired or under the weather because they know how important it is to attend every lesson. Some students gave up in exams because they didn't know an answer to a question, and they stopped trying and put their head down. However, those with resilience gave it their best and kept trying despite finding things difficult. Resilience and determination, one of our school values are closely linked. We strive to be people who don't give up. When things get difficult and challenging, do we persist in the face of difficulties or do we just give up. Coming in and powering through days when we don't feel 100%, doing our best to finish exams and our homework, even when we don't know all the answers, these are the things that build character and will help us to be successful in the long term. At the end of his talk, Mr Aung asked all students a

question: What part of school life do you lack resilience in? He then gave students 20 seconds to think and then asked them to write on their white board one commitment they can make to improve their resilience. They shared this with their tutors. When you have time, I encourage you to ask your child what they wrote and discuss with them ways to improve their resilience. It will make a huge difference to how they handle life's setbacks.

It has been great to see Year 11 have a taste of Sixth Form life during the two transition days at the end of this week. They looked incredibly smart and it was really exciting to see them engaging so positively with their taster lessons and imagining them starting as our new Year 12 cohort in September.

Following on from National Offer Day, many of our Year 6 families came for tours of the school. They were very impressed with the focus and engagement in lessons and I couldn't have been prouder of the excellent teaching and learning on display. The Elms Academy is the first choice for many families and if you were to come by school at any time during a regular school day, you would see why.
